PROFILE

Sree Narayana College, Kollam is one of the earliest and the greatest centres of higher education in the whole state of Kerala. Affiliated to the University of Kerala, the College is managed by the Sree Narayana Trusts, Kollam. Bearing in letter and spirit the name of Sree Narayana Guru (1854-1928), the great saint-philosopher, social reformer and mystic poet, the college was started in 1948 by S.N.D.P. Yogam and its able and inspiring leader R. Sankar (1909-1972) with 505 students at the Intermediate level. Next year it was upgraded to a Degree college and in 1957 it attained membership in the prestigious club of Postgraduate colleges. Today the college offers 17 undergraduate and 14 postgraduate courses. Nine of the Postgraduate Departments are approved research centres as well.

The institution further provides facilities (both infrastructure and faculty) for conducting contact classes of the correspondence courses of IGNOU coordinated by the IGNOU Study Centre.

Since its inception in 1948, Sree Narayana College, Kollam has not only spearheaded the uplift of the socially and educationally backward sections of our society but has also created a glorious history of outstanding academic activities, thus making itself the leader of the institutions of higher education in the State.

AIM OF THE COLLEGE

The college aims at achieving the high ideals of Sree Narayana Guru who exhorted us to 'strive for the welfare of all without any discrimination on the basis of caste, creed or religion'. The Guru was a Karmayogi who transformed the idealistic Advaita of his predecessors to a practical humanistic one by giving an ethical and social context to it. Imbibing the teachings of the great Guru such as "One Caste, One Religion, One God for man", "Liberate oneself through education", "Humanity marks humanity", our college strives to mould generations in order to free them from casteism, bigotry, sectarianism and exploitation. We consider education an instrument of socio-economic progress, political development and moral, social and intellectual awakening in each student.

LOCATION

The college is situated on a vast 27 acres campus along the National Highway-47 in the heart of Kollam City, on the eastern part of the Lal Bahadur Stadium, one km. away from Kollam Railway Station.

MANAGEMENT OF THE COLLEGE

The Management of the college is vested in the Sree Narayana Trusts, Kollam, one of the leading educational agencies in the State. There is a Managing Committee which consists of the members of the Executive Council of the Sree Narayana Trusts and the Principal. The Secretary of the Trusts is the Manager of the College. There is also a Regional Development Committee (RDC) to assist the Trusts in the Management of the college.

Facilities are available for both full-time and part-time research.

Admission to Research Programme:

Applications in the prescribed form are invited by the University twice a year, in June and December.

Eligibility: Students

Only candidates who have qualified in the Entrance Test conducted by the University of Kerala or National Eligibility Test conducted by the UGC/CSIR or GATE or State Level Eligibility Test conducted by the Kerala Government or who possess M.Phil Degree by research in addition to a Masters Degree or its equivalent with not less than 55% marks will be considered eligible to apply for registration for Ph.D. (SC/ST 45% marks in Science, 40% marks in Arts and Commerce).

Eligibility: College Teachers

5% marks relaxation for the candidates with minimum 10 years of teaching experience. Teachers with 7 years of teaching experience are exempted from the Entrance Test.

The maximum number of candidates permitted to work under a research guide in the college is five. Teachers are allowed to do part-time research. Candidates shall send their applications to the Registrar, University of Kerala through the college.

FIRST DEGREE PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

The First Degree Programmes include (1) Language Courses, (2) Foundation Courses, (3) Core Courses in the Major Subjects related to Degree Programmes, (4) Complementary Courses on allied subjects, (5) Open Course, (6) Elective Courses and (7) Project/Dissertation. In the case of Career Related First Degree programmes under CBCSS, there shall be a component of Vocational Course.

1. Semester

Semester means a term consisting of 90 working days distributed over a minimum period of 18 weeks.

2. Course

Course means a portion of a subject to be taught and evaluated in a semester. A course of 4 credits will meet a minimum of 4 hours per week and treated as full course. A semi course of one credit will meet atleast one hour per week in a semester.

3. Language Courses

Language Courses are courses in English and an additional language of students' choice. Students who join for any B.A./B.Sc programme in this college have to study 5 courses in English and 4 courses in additional language. The additional languages offered are Malayalam, Hindi and Sanskrit. Those who join B.Com programme have to study 4 courses in English and 2 courses in additional language.

4. Foundation Courses

Students who join for B.A./B.Sc. programmes have to study one course under language and one course under core. For B.Com programme students have to take up both the foundation courses under the core subject.

5. Core Courses

Core course means compulsory course in a main subject related to the First Degree Programme (FDP) in a discipline. Students who join for B.A./B.Sc. programmes have to study compulsory 12-15 core courses and submit one dissertation/project report. For B.Com Programme a student has to attempt 16 core courses and submit one dissertation/project work.

6. Complementary Courses

Complementary Course means a course in a subject other than the major subject and is complementary to the main subject. Students who join for B.A./B.Sc. programmes have to study 8 to 10 complementary courses while for B.Com programme a student has to choose 4 complementary courses.

7. Open/Elective Course

Students who join for B.A./B.Sc. programmes have to study two courses to a minimum of 4 credits and for B.Com Degree programme a student has to study 6 courses to a minimum of 20 credits. Open course means an optional course which the student is free to take at his/her will. Open Course shall be a course offered by the Departments other than the Parent Department. Elective course means a specialized course from the frontier area of core subject.

8. Audit Courses

Courses which student can register without earning credits (Zero Credit Course) and are not compulsory for completing the degree programme. Courses for more than the stated number of credits (120) may be obtained through audit courses.

9. Repeat course

Repeat course is a course that a student repeats if he/she has failed in it. Repeat courses are possible with the next batch for failed candidates. Students who complete the semester, by securing the minimum required attendance and by registering for ESE of each semester alone shall be promoted to higher semester. Students who fail to secure minimum required aggregate attendance during a semester shall be given one or more chances to repeat the semester along with the subsequent batch of students after obtaining re-admission subjected to the condition that the candidate has to complete the programme in not more than 12 continuous semesters and that the candidate has to appear for CE afresh each time.

10. Credit

Credit of a course is measure of the weekly unit of work involving lecture or laboratory session or seminar or similar activity designed for the course. Each credit hour is roughly equivalent to one hour of class time per week in a semester.

11. Attendance

Students who secure a minimum of 75% attendance in the aggregate for all the Courses of a semester taken together alone will be allowed to register for End Semester Evaluation (ESE). Others have to repeat the semester along with the next batch, unless they could make up the shortage of attendance through condonation. However, the award of Grade for attendance in CE shall be made course-wise. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester subject to a maximum of two times during the whole period of a Degree Programme shall be granted by the University on valid grounds. Benefits of attendance for a maximum of 10 days in a semester shall be granted to students who attend to University Union activities, meetings of University bodies and participation in extra curricular activities by treating as present for the days of their absence for the above purpose on production of participation/attendance certificate in such activities issued by the University Authorities/Principal.

12. Social Service/Extension Activities

Social Services and Extension activities are mandatory for all students in 3rd & 4th semester with a minimum attendance of 40 hours. A Student who makes achievement in Sports/Arts/N.C.C./N.S.S. shall get Grace Marks. The College offers the following Social Services and Extension Activities/Clubs.

1. National Cadet Corps (NCC), 2. National Service Scheme (NSS), 3. Nature Club/Eco Club, 4. Sports Club, 5. Health Education, 6. Womens' Study Unit, 7. Debate Club, 8. Literary Club, 9. Media Club, 10. Science Club, 11. Planning Forum, 12. Anti-Ragging Cell, 13. Environmental Activities (Bio Diversity Club)

13. Evaluation

The Evaluation of each Course shall consists of two parts :

- 1) Continuous Evaluation (CE)
- 2) End Semester Evaluation (ESE)

The CE and ESE ratio shall be 1:4 for both Courses with or without practical. There shall be a maximum of 80 marks for ESE and maximum of 20 marks for CE. For all Courses (Theory and Practical).

Continuous Evaluation (CE)

The marks of CE shall be consolidated by adding the marks of Attendance, Assignment/Seminar and test paper respectively for a particular Course.

Attendance (Max. marks 5):

The allotment of marks for attendance shall be as follows:

less than 60%	0 Marks
60% to 70%	1 marks
70% to 75%	2 marks
75% to 79%	3 marks
80% to 89%	4 Marks
90% to 100%	5 Marks

Assignments or Seminars (Max. marks 5)

Each student shall be required to do one assignment or one seminar for each Course. Valued assignments shall be returned to the students. The seminars shall be organized by the teacher/teachers in charge of CE and the same shall be assessed by a group of teachers including the teacher/teachers in charge of that Course. Assignments/Seminars shall be evaluated on the basis of their quality. The teacher shall be similarly evaluated in terms of structure, content, presentation, interaction, etc.

Tests (Max. marks 10)

For each Course there shall be one class tests during a semester. Valued answer scripts shall be made available to the students for perusal within 10 working days from the date of the test.

End Semester Evaluation (ESE)

ESE of all Courses in all the semesters shall be conducted by the University. The results of the ESE shall be arranged to be published according to the Examination Calendar prescribed by the University Level Monitoring Committee (ULMC), which shall not exceed 45 days from the last day of the examination. The maximum mark for a Course (ESE theory) is 80. The duration of ESE is 3 hours.

Total marks for the ESE of Practical is 80. The components of ESE of Practical have to be set by the Chairman, Board of Studies, concerned. The marks for the components of Practical for Continuous Evaluation shall be as shown below.

The marks of a Course are consolidated by combining the marks of ESE and CE (80+20).

A minimum of 40% marks (CE+ESE) is required for passing a Course (E Grade) with a separate minimum of 35% (E Grade) for CE & ESE from 2015 admission onwards.

14. Project/Dissertation Work

For each First Degree programme there shall be a Project/Dissertation Work. The Project/Dissertation work can be done either individually or by a group not exceeding five students. However, Viva-Voce based on the Project/Dissertation work shall be conducted individually. The topics shall either be allotted by the supervising teacher or be selected by the students in consultation with the supervising teacher. The report of the Project/Dissertation shall be submitted to the Department in duplicate before the completion of the sixth semester. There shall be no continuous assessment for Dissertation/project work. A Board of two Examiners appointed by the University shall evaluate the report of the Project/Dissertation work. The Detailed guidelines regarding the conduct and evaluation of the Project/Dissertation will be framed by the Board of Studies concerned.

15. Grading System

Grade indicates the level of performance of a student in a course. 'Grade Point' is an integer indicating the numerical equivalent of the broad level of performance of a student in a course. The product of Grade point and the credit of a course is called 'credit point' (CP).

16. Semester Credit Point Average (SCPA)

SCPA is an index of overall performance of a student at the end of a semester. It is obtained by dividing the sum of the credit points (CP) obtained by a student (multiply the grade point obtained by the student in each course by the credit of that course) at the end of a semester by the sum of the credits of courses taken by the student that semester. After the successful completion of a semester, Semester Credit Point Average (SCPA) of a student in that semester shall be calculated.

Suppose the student has taken four Courses each of 4 Credits and Two Courses each of 2 Credits in a particular semester, after consolidating the Grade for each Course. SCPA has to be calculated as shown in the example given below:

SCPA = Total Credit Points/Total Credits = 119.8/20=5.99=D Grade

For the successful completion of a semester, a student has to score a minimum SCPA of 4.00 (E Grade). However, a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of his / her SCPA.

17. Cumulative Credit Point Average (CCPA)

CCPA Indicates the broad academic level of performance of the student in a programme. It is obtained by dividing the sum of the credit points in all the courses taken by the student for the entire programme by the total number of credit.

For the successful completion of a Programme and award of the Degree, a student must pass all Courses satisfying the minimum Credit requirement of 120 and must score a minimum CCPA of 4.00 or an overall grade of E.

18. Repetition of the Semester Courses:

Students who fail to secure the minimum required aggregate attendance during a semester shall be given one chance to repeat the semester along with the subsequent batch of students after obtaining re-admission and they will have to repeat the CE for all Courses.

The normal duration of the First Degree Programme shall be three years consisting of six semesters. No students shall be allowed to complete the programme by attending more than 12 continuous semesters.

19. Re-appearance of Failed Students:

Students who fail shall have to reappear for the ESE of the same along with the next regular batch of students. Candidates who fail to score 'E' grade in the ESE in any of the Course/Courses have to reappear for the ESE of the Course/Courses Concerned with next regular batch of students. The number of chances or such appearances is limited to 5 and the same have to be done within a period of 12 continuous semesters including the semester in which they have first appeared.

However, students who fail to secure SCPA of 4.00 have to reappear for the ESE with the next regular batch of students for such courses for which they have secured the least Grade for improving the SCPA. Here also the number of appearance is limited to 5 and the same has to be done within a period of 12 continuous semesters including the semester in which they have first appeared.

In both cases (i.e. failure to obtain 'E' Grade for individual Course/Courses and 'SCPA of 4.00) students shall not be allowed to repeat the semester, but the marks secured by them for the CE part shall be carried over and added to the marks obtained in the ESE they reappear. However, those who fail in the CE (i.e. those who fail to secure a minimum of 'E' grade) will have one chance to improve the same (except the marks for attendance) along with next regular batch of students.

20. Improvement of ESE

- ◆ The maximum Grace marks awarded to a student in a year for all the activities put together shall not exceed 25 %.
- ◆ Course wise distribution shall be followed and Grace marks need not be awarded to a student if he/she secures less than 10% of the maximum marks for that theory course (external).
- ◆ The basic criteria for the award of Grace Marks shall be representing the University when called upon to do so. In case the University has not called upon the candidates to represent the University, Grace Marks shall be awarded only to those candidates who have participated in the Kerala University Inter Collegiate Competitions / Selection Trials in that particular academic year except those candidates who secure places in the National Competitions and those who represent the nation in international competitions, approved by the National Federations, Kerala Sports Council and University of Kerala.

OFFICE ADMINISTRATION

The college office, headed by the Administrative Assistant, co-ordinates all the functions of the non-teaching staff. The various departments maintain their official relations and transactions with the University, U.G.C. and other external organizations through the college office. FEE REGULATIONS

PAYMENT OF FEES

Fees are to be paid in two instalments.

June : First instalment of Tuition Fee including the special fee from all students

November : Second instalments of tuition fees

Collection of Fees : On or before the seventh working day of the month.

With Fine : ₹ 5/- on or before the 10th day after due date. ₹ 10/- thereafter.

If the fee and fine of an instalment are not paid before the last opportunity given for payment of the instalment, the name of the student will be removed from the rolls of the college with effect from the date following the last date for fees and the student will not get the benefit of attendance from the date of removal.

Re-admission : With the special permission of the Principal, the student has to remit all the arrears of fees with fine and Re admission of Fee ₹ 50/-. The re-admitted students will get the benefit of attendance only from the date of re-admission.

(Last opportunity is defined as the last working day previous to the date of the succeeding instalment. For the last instalment, the last opportunity is fixed as 5 March. Absence (with or without leave) from the college shall not be an excuse for non-payment of fees on the due date.

CAUTION DEPOSIT

Caution deposit realised from every student on admission will be refunded on completion of the course or if the student leaves the college with T.C. after adjusting dues, if any. Students should produce the caution deposit receipt along with the application for refund. Amounts that remain unclaimed for three years will be forfeited.

ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES

Transfer Certificate : A student applying for a T.C. shall not be given the certificate except on payment of all fees or other money due or such portion thereof as the principal may see fit to demand for the academic year in which the student was last enrolled.

Transfer Certificates of students who have appeared for a University Examination will ordinarily be issued to them only after the publication of the result of the examination.

Late applicants have to pay a penalty ₹ 50/- and a fee of ₹ 100/- will be charged for the issue of a duplicate of Transfer Certificate.

Conduct Certificate : Any student who leaves the college without the written permission of the principal before completing his/her course will not be issued a certificate of character. Any student who discontinues his/her study in the college without returning a book issued to him/her or without paying any arrears or other dues shall receive no certificate of character or any other certificate.

A fee of ₹ 10/- one will be charged for the issue of certificates from the college.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE COLLEGE

MORNING PRAYER AND CLASS HOURS

Classes in the morning commence with the '*Daiva Dasakam*' (Prayer of Humanity). Staff and students stand in reverential silence during its soothing and melodious rendering.

The College works under the full day system with two sessions. In between the two sessions there is a noon interval of thirty minutes from 12.50 pm to 1.20 pm. Besides Lecture classes, there are Seminars, Tutorials, Group discussions and Counselling.

ATTENDANCE

1. Those who secure a minimum of 75% attendance during the semester only will be allowed to register for the End Semester Examinations. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of each class.
2. No student shall absent himself/herself from a class without leave.
3. In case of absence on account of illness, a medical certificate is to be produced.
4. Condonation of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester subject to a maximum of two times during the whole period of the U.G. and P.G. programme may be granted by the University. Union activities, meetings of the University bodies and participation in extra curricular activities will be treated as present for the above purposes on production of participation/attendance certificate in such activities, subject to a maximum of 10 days in a semester.
5. Students whose attendance falls below the minimum of 75% shall apply for exemption through the Principal to the University.
6. Fee for exemption from attendance shortage upto 10 days ₹ 100. Application for condonation should be forwarded atleast 10 days before the commencement of the university examinations.

DRESS, BEHAVIOUR AND DISCIPLINE

1. Every student is expected to be decent, cultured, polished and pleasing in his words and deeds inside and outside the college.
2. Students are expected to greet the teachers respectfully when they meet them.

3. Students are required to be neat and tidy in dress and person. They are advised to be courteous.
4. Students should handle college properties with care. Further, they are expected to do whatever they can to protect and promote the beauty, charm and dignity of the campus. Any damage done to college property will have to be made good.
5. Students should not write, carve or paint anything on any part of the college building, walls, furniture, etc.
6. Students shall take their seat in the class as soon as the bell is given. They shall rise when the teacher enters the classroom and remain standing till he/she takes his/her seat and directs them to sit down. They should keep with them Texts and Note books required for the classes they attend.
7. No student is allowed to enter or leave the classroom when the session is on without the permission of the teacher.
8. Students shall not roam about verandas and corridors during working hours.
9. Students are not allowed to stand or move about the verandas or do anything which might disturb the classes during working hours.
10. No notice, petition, etc. of any kind shall be circulated among students for publicity without the permission of the Principal.
11. No meeting or function of any kind shall be held on the campus without the prior permission of the Principal.
12. Political activism is strictly banned on the campus as per the Hon'ble High Court Order No. WP(C)No. 32540/2015(N) dated 27.10.2015 Students are forbidden to organise or attend meetings other than the official ones.
13. Students shall not take active part in political agitations directed against the Government or the Management.
14. Students on strike are strictly prohibited from entering the veranda or the class room or shouting slogans on the campus.
15. All strikes, demonstrations, agitations, dharnas, hartals and the like are banned on the college campus. Students who violate this rule shall be dismissed summarily.
16. Political activities are summarily banned on the college campus. Students engaging in any such activity which may cause disruption to classes or disturbance on the college campus are liable to be dismissed from the college.
17. Students are strictly prohibited from holding meetings or collecting any fund without the written permission of the Principal.
18. Smoking, chewing, snuffing and other unwholesome practices are strictly prohibited on the campus.

19. Irregular attendance, insubordination to teachers, indifference in class, habitual mischief-making obscenity in deeds or words are sufficient reasons for suspension or dismissal of a student from the college.
20. Minor offences are punishable with fine.
21. Malpractices at exams and test papers will be severely dealt with.
22. Any genuine grievance of students may be brought to the notice of the Principal either directly or through the group tutor.
23. The Principal is the final authority in the interpretation of the college byelaws and he reserves the right to frame and enforce rules governing the conduct of students in the class rooms and on the campus.
24. All students admitted to the college should keep with them their Identity cards, with recent passport size photographs, duly attested by the Principal. The students should produce their Identity cards as and when the teaching staff, office staff or any other members of the college service demand it.
25. Mobile phones are banned on the campus. (For Students)

FACILITIES IN THE CAMPUS

COLLEGE LIBRARY

The primary purpose of the College Library is to support the teaching, learning, research and other academic programmes of the college by collecting, co-ordinating and disseminating information. At present, the library has a large collection exceeding one lakh books which include reference books, text books, treatises, fiction, back volumes of journals etc. The Library subscribes to 35 periodicals, 60 journals and 9 news papers. Library membership is open to all staff and students.

The library system in our college is computerised. We have prepared the bibliographic database of books and journals to provide easy and accurate access to the available information. Users can use computer terminals for searching and retrieving the available information. Internet facility is available in the library.

The library has 3 sections - Reference Section, Circulation Section and Periodical Section. The working time of the library is from 9.30 AM to 4.30 PM

2. Books, periodicals and newspapers should be handled with care and returned intact before leaving the library. All marking, underlining etc. in any book belonging to the library is forbidden. Students are expected to be co-operative in keeping the library neat and tidy. Loud reading and talking in the library are strictly prohibited.
3. Members are not permitted to take home books belonging to the Reference Section. Books will be issued only on production of Borrower's ticket. Loss of Borrower's ticket must be reported to the librarian and a new ticket will be issued on payment of ₹ 5/-.
4. Books issued to the students should not be retained for more than 14 days. An overdue charge @ ₹ 1/day will be collected from defaulters.
5. Members can renew/reserve books for their future use.
6. Damage in any book must at once be reported to the librarian; otherwise the borrower will be held responsible for damage that may be discovered later
7. If any book is lost, the person concerned will have to replace the book or pay the cost of it together with the stipulated fine.
8. Books taken for a vacation shall be returned within the first 3 working days after reopening.
9. A student against whom any charges are outstanding will not be issued books from the library.
10. Students shall return their library cards at the end of their course for getting library clearance.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS (N.C.C.)

The NCC which is administered through the Ministry of Defense, is one of the premier voluntary youth organizations in our country, contributed in propagating national unity and intersity among youth. Students who have undergone NCC training have self-discipline leadership qualities good value system and all -round personalities diserogment.

The aims of NCC are as follows.

- To develop qualities of character, courage, comradeship, discipline, leadership, secular outlook, spirit of adventure and sportsmanship and ideals of selfless service among the youth to make them useful citizens.
- To create a human resource of organized, trained and motivated youth to provide leadership in all walks of life including the Armed Forces, and be always available for the service of the nation.
- To create suitable environment to motivate the youth to take up a carrer in the armed forces.

The sub unit of the NCC, Navy wing started functioning in this college on 1st September 1969. The authorized strength is 50.

Enrolment of cadets in the NCC is made at the beginning of the academic year. The cadets have to undergo a minimum of four hours training a week, so as to make a total of 70 training hours a year. Training is imparted usually on Saturdays.

Discharge certificates are issued to those who successfully attend not less than 75% of the training periods. B and C certificate examinations are conducted by the end of the academic year. NCC kits issued to the cadets should be returned before the month of March every year and a 'No dues' certificate should be obtained from the NCC officer.

Academic incentives : NCC cadets who secure more than 75% of attendance are eligible for weightage marks for their admission to various courses. Seats are also reserved in various professional courses.

NCC cadets are also eligible for grace marks under CBCS System. The Grace marks obtained by a student can be distributed to the End Semester Examination of the difference courses in a semester or among to semesters in an academic year as per the choice of the students. The students shall claim the grace mark with in six months after the end of the academic year.

WALK WITH A SCHOLAR (WWS)

Walk With a Scholar is a 'New Initiative in Higher Education' by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Kerala. The Scheme aims at giving necessary orientation to needy students, to prepare them for employment and give them necessary guidance, motivation and necessary mental support to identify appropriate areas for higher study as well as employment.

Admission to the scheme is voluntary in nature. A student of the first year degree programme with a minimum of 60% mark is eligible to apply for admission. Maximum number of students to the program is 30. The scholars for this programme were selected on the basis of merit of qualifying examination and interest. They were grouped into five and assigned to 6 internal mentors.

A college should select a maximum of 6 subjects and a maximum of 50 students under the Programme. One of the subjects to be identified must be English (Common) for which 10 students may be selected. The other subjects may be identified as per the needs of the college and students and based on 'Results Analysis work for the Scholar Support Programme. 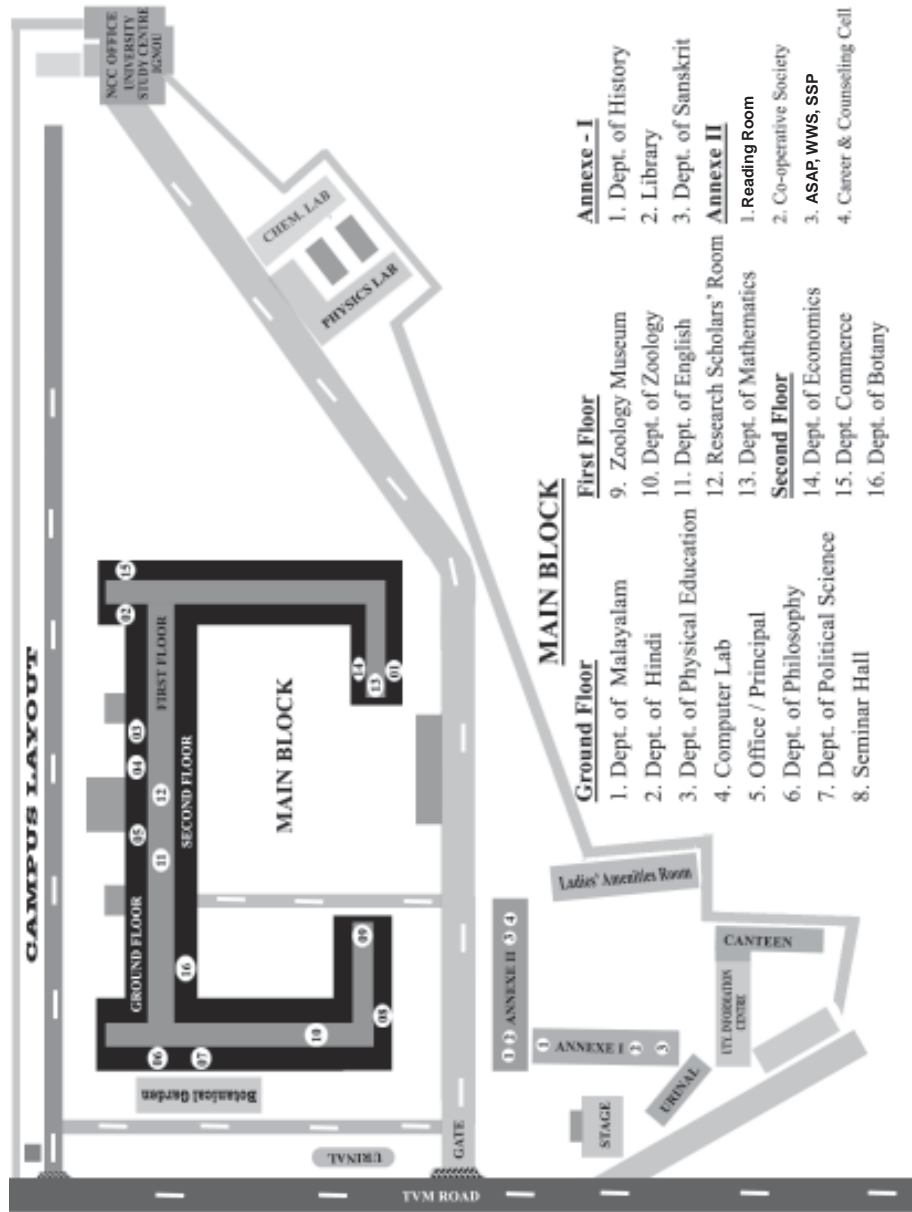
